## From the Rector's Desk 🔲

Those of you who get our church calendar online (at <a href="www.stpetersnewkent.org">www.stpetersnewkent.org</a>) may have noticed that on many days a name can be found. For example, you will see on March 18 "Cyril, Bishop of Jerusalem, 386." Cyril, of course, is his name; Bishop of Jerusalem is what he's remembered for, and 386 is the year he died. (We almost always remember these folks on their death date.) This is the "liturgical calendar" and tells us who we're commemorating that day. Then there's a printed resource entitled LESSER FEASTS AND FASTS, which gives much more detail about the person (or persons). I find it helpful in my own devotional life to see who these people are, since the Episcopal Church honors such a wide variety of people across the centuries. In February and March alone we are commemorating folks who died anywhere between the year 386 and 1970. We've heard of the "big ones," of course, like St. Patrick (Bishop and Missionary of Ireland, 461) and John Donne (Priest, 1631 – "Ask not for whom the bell tolls, it tolls for thee"). But it's the lesser-known ones I want to "commemorate" to you in this edition of THE KEYS. Here are a few of them.

February 1: Brigid (Bride), Abbess, 523. Born a Druid, but early in her life she became a nun. One of the patron saints of Ireland along with Patrick, she founded a nunnery in Kildare, and eventually persuaded Conlaed to move his community of monks there, establishing the only double monastery of men and women in Ireland. She is also know for her life-long concern for the poor.

February 5: The Martyrs of Japan, 1597. Christianity was introduced into Japan in the 16<sup>th</sup> century by the Jesuits under Francis Xavier, followed by the Franciscans. By the end of that century there were some 300,000 Christians in Japan. Although initially welcomed by the Emperor, who thought they would dilute the power of the Buddhists, eventually the tide turned. The first victims were six Franciscan friars and twenty of their converts who were crucified at Nagasaki on February 5, 1597. Over the next 40 plus years more than a thousand would be martyred.

February 13: Absalom Jones, Priest, 1818. Born a "house slave" in 1746, in Delaware, he bought his own freedom in 1784. In 1787, Black Christians organized the Free Africa Society, the first organized African-American Society, and founded their own church, St. Thomas African Episcopalian Church, which was admitted into the Diocese of Pennsylvania in 1794. Bishop White ordained Jones as Deacon in 1795, and as Priest in 1802, the first African-American Priest in the United States.

February 14: Cyril and Methodius, Monk and Bishop, Missionary to the Slavs, 869, 885. These two are fascinating. Born in Thessalonika (which you know from St. Paul's letter to the Thessalonians!), they went to Moravia in 862 at the invitation of the king, who knew the brothers spoke Slavic. However, there was not a written language, so they invented one: "glagolithic," which later became a different written language, Cyrillic, named in honor of Cyril by his followers. Cyril died in Rome in 869 and was buried there. Methodius completed a Slavonic translation of the Bible and of Byzantine ecclesiastical law while serving as a missionary.

March 21: Thomas Ken, Bishop of Bath and Wells, 1711. Born in 1637, throughout his life he was both rewarded and punished for his integrity. Appointed chaplain to Princess Mary of Orange at The Hague, he was appalled at the Prince's treatment of his wife and rebuked him publicly. Returning to England in 1683, he became chaplain to Charles the Second, whom he also rebuked publicly for "lax behavior." The king then attempted to have his mistress lodged at Ken's house, but the good Bishop successfully refused. It's a long and fascinating story well worth your reading. He is remembered primarily as an author of hymns, three of which can be found in our own THE HYMNAL 1982.

March 29: John Keble, Priest, 1866. His "Assize Day" sermon of 1833 ignited the Oxford Movement. Those drawn to the Movement began to publish a series of "Tracts for our Times," from whence came the name "Tractarians." These tracts were intended to recall the Church to its ancient sacramental heritage. Although bitterly attacked, his loyalty to his Church was unwavering. Within three years of his death, a college bearing his name was established at Oxford "to give an education in strict fidelity to the Church of England." We have two of his hymns in our hymnal as well.

Now switch gears for a moment. A hundred years from now LESSER FEASTS AND FASTS 2118 comes out. Your name is in it. [your name here] [what you were] [the year of your death]. In the paragraphs that follow, what would you like people to know about you, to remember from your life? Lent is a time of *metanoia*, of turning around, of starting on a new page. What will you write on that clean, blank page this year, and in the years to come?


