From the Rector's Desk 📖

I've been thinking of death a lot lately. Got your attention now? Two friends recently died, one from pancreatic cancer and the other from liver failure caused by a rare infection, and both died much too soon. Then came the balloon accident in Caroline County that killed three people, two of whom were connected with the University of Richmond, all of whom died much too soon. The University of Richmond women were 24 and 44, and the pilot was 65.

The subject came up in our last Vestry meeting, too, in a more roundabout way. Currently there are no burial lots available in our churchyard. There are vacancies, of course; a lot that has a capacity of six might have only two currently occupied, but the lots have all been sold. So if you wish to have your remains reside at St. Peter's until the general resurrection, your option is limited to having your cremated remains interred (just the ashes – no urn) or scattered in the Memorial Garden.

The number of people choosing cremation has increased significantly. In 1996, 20% chose cremation; in 2011 that number had increased to over 40%. In some states, the number is over 70%. Part of the reason is cost, since cremation costs about a third of a traditional burial, but there are many other factors in play as well.

Some time ago, when the Curling expansion of the Clopton Meditation Garden was in the planning phase, there was discussion of incorporating a columbarium in the wall. But it was decided to keep the Meditation Garden strictly a place for meditation, and not change it to be both a memorial garden and a meditation garden.

The subject of a columbarium has come up again. If you're unfamiliar with them, think of a Post Office box large enough to hold two urns. Typically it's a wall that can be straight, curved, serpentine – brick, stone, or a combination of the two – possibly a bench or two for visitors – as you can see, there are a lot of options. The Vestry has formed an exploratory work group to determine if there's enough interest to go forward, and if so, where it would go, what it would look like, all that sort of thing. If you're interested, please let me or Bill O'Keefe know (billo38@icloud.com).

Finally, let me encourage you to have "that conversation" with your spouse or a loved one. Mortality is not optional, as much as we might like to think so, nor do we always get much warning. Making plans ahead of time makes sure your wishes are respected and that someone else doesn't have to make those difficult choices for you.

We are finishing up another year of Church School, Children's Choir, and Adult Education, as we prepare for the summer break. Youth Sunday is right around the corner. is preparing for another trip this summer. There are so many wonderful things to celebrate at St. Peter's Parish Church!



How to Prevent Falls

My last newsletter article included tips for preventing fires. A second component to the National Fire Protection Association conference was preventing falls. No one, of any age, likes to fall; however, falls are a major threat to the health and independence of older adults, people aged 65 and older. Each year in the United States, nearly one-third of older adults experience a fall.

Falls can be devastating. About one out of ten falls among older adults result in a serious injury, such as a hip fracture or head injury, that requires hospitalization. In addition to the physical and emotional pain, many people need to spend at least a year recovering in a long-term care facility. Unfortunately, some never return to their homes.

Falls can be deadly. Falls are the leading cause of injury deaths among older adults. The rate of fall related deaths among older adults in the United States has risen significantly over the past decade.

The good news is that the opportunity to help reduce falls has never been better. The eight tips listed below can significantly reduce your risk of falls.

- **Exercise regularly** to build strength and improve your balance and coordination. Ask your doctor about the best physical exercise for you.
- **Take your time.** Get out of chairs slowly. Sit a moment before you get out of your bed. Stand and get you balance before you walk. Be aware of your surroundings.

Keep stairs and walking areas free of electrical cords, shoes, clothing, books, magazines, and other items.

- **Improve the lighting** in and outside your home. Use nightlights or a flashlight to light the path between your bedroom and the bathroom. Turn on the lights before using the stairs. See an eye specialist once a year—better vision can help prevent falls.
- Use non-slip mats in the bathtub and on shower floors. Have grab bars installed on the wall next to the bathtub, shower, and toilet. Wipe up spilled liquids immediately.
- **Be aware of uneven surfaces** indoors and outdoors. Use only throw rugs that have rubber, non-skid backing. Consider non-skid pads under rungs. Always smooth out wrinkles and folds in carpeting. Be aware of uneven sidewalks and pavements outdoors. Ask a family member or friends to clear ice and snow from outside stairs and walkways and always use hand rails if available. Step carefully.
- Stairways should be well lit from both the top and bottom. Have easy-to-grip handrails installed along the full length of both sides of the stairs.
- Wear sturdy, well-fitting, low-heeled shoes with non-slip soles. They are safer than high heels, thicksoled athletic shoes, slippers, or stocking feet.

Burial at St. Peter's

Presently, burial at St. Peter's is limited to those who own burial plots or those who choose to have their ashes scattered or interred in the Memorial Garden.

Since the preference for cremation has increased significantly, from 20% in 1996 to over 40% in 2011, the Vestry has set up a work group to determine if St. Peter's should construct a columbarium. A columbarium is a wall that contains niches where ashes of loved ones in urns or other appropriate containers can be permanently housed with identifying plaques.

The first task of the work group will be to conduct a survey to determine parishioner interest in cremation and burial at St. Peter's. 
