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From the Rector's Desk

On August 22 this year our Bishop had a piece published in the *Richmond Times-Dispatch*, entitled "An Episcopal response to gun violence." You can look it up on their website if you want to read it, but I suggest you not do that and you'll understand why if you keep reading. My original intention was to write this column about how guns weren't the problem, and truth be told, I would say that they aren't. The problem is in the hearts and minds of human beings. That's what the Church should be concerned with, not whatever they hold in their hand, be it guns, knives, or pressure cookers. To use language from the homily of September 8, it's not the Church's business; changing hearts and minds is. How do we do that? Bishop Ann Sherer, the retired United Methodist Bishop of Missouri, liked to ask churches what business they were in. It's a really good question. Many times churches get so busy we forget our business. As our own Bishop Frank Gray used to say, "We forget to keep the main thing the main thing. "

The church, Bishop Sherer said, has three primary businesses. The first is to invite persons to be followers of Christ. The second is to form people into disciples of Christ. And the third is to send people into the world in the name of Christ to transform the world. So our first business is to invite people to be followers of Jesus Christ. This may be the one we resist the most. Most of us have probably had a bad experience with some obnoxious evangelist, usually the "televangelist" version, or we have some bad experience with evangelism, and now we resist the whole idea of evangelism. The joke is that when you cross a Jehovah's Witness with an Episcopalian, you get someone who will knock on your door and then doesn't know what to say. But somewhere, somehow, someplace, someday, someone invited you to come and follow Jesus Christ.

We make that invitation in a number of ways. We have a listing in the yellow pages, for one thing, and an ad in the local newspaper. We have an excellent website thanks to Rod Molina, and an every week e-mail called the "E-Pistle," thanks to Joyce Molina. We have visitors who tell us they found us from the ad in the paper or from our website or through a Google search. Each month we get a list of people who have moved into the county, and Pete Carlson sends them a letter welcoming them to New Kent and inviting them to St. Peter's. That's not really enough because most of us did not become a part of the church just because we read about it in the yellow pages or the newspaper or got a postcard or read about a church online. Most of us became a part of the body of Christ because someone else invited us.

Our second business to form disciples of Christ. Discipleship implies a deeper level of commitment. It is our job to offer people opportunities to let God get his hands on them, to form them like clay shaped on the potter's wheel, in Jeremiah's memorable image. We do this in a variety of ways. We do it week by week in worship and prayer, in service and study. But you have to be willing to put yourself on the potter's wheel and let yourself be shaped.

The third business of the church is to send those disciples of Christ out into the world to transform it. It's not enough just to call people in, to invite people, to say come here and get your life shaped, get to know Christ better, get a little deeper in your prayer life and spirituality, and then not send them back into the world. The business of the church is to send people into the world to be examples – disciples – and ambassadors of Christ.

That's the way we change our communities, our country, and the world.

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Christian Education

Adult Forum

Fr. Paul has asked me to lead Adult Christian Education this year. First order of business, change the name of this thing to "Adult Forum." Since I am not an ordained priest or a trained educator, I can't pretend to educate nor can I profess making anyone a better "Christian," whatever that means in the year 2013. As you may already know, I have been leading the high school class with Bill Lindsey for about ten years. This year Bill will co-teach with Kim von Hitritz and the middle school and high school classes will be combined. So that frees me up.

I am a 2009 graduate of the Education for Ministry Program (EfM), a concentrated four-year course of study sponsored by the University of the South: School of Theology in Sewanee. I attended classes at Westover Parish Church in Charles City County from 2005 to 2009, one night a week during the school year. I had the pleasure of being in the class with three other St. Peter's parishioners: Norm Valor, Brett Marshall, and Bobby Nelms. The curriculum is: 1) Years One and Two - Old Testament, 2) Year Three - New Testament, and 3) Year Four - Church History and Philosophy. Because of EfM, Fr. Paul has asked the four of us to lead Morning Prayer from time to time. So what are we going to be doing in Adult Forum?

My focus with the high school students and my focus for the Adult Forum will NOT be to go over well-trodden ground. We will be looking at *mysticism* and *spirituality*. Our primary text will be THE MYSTIC CHRIST by Ethan Walker. As Walker says, "We will be peeling the onion off of two millennia of self imposed rules, regulations, and traditions to get at the very core of faith." He further explains:



THE MYSTIC CHRIST reveals the life and teachings of Jesus to be an ancient tale of mystic union, salvation, and enlightenment. It is the careful uncovering of a lost treasure of immeasurable value, long buried in the suffocating darkness of conventional orthodoxy on one side, and blind fundamentalist extremism on the other. From the viewpoint of the world's mystical religious traditions, the brilliant light of Jesus' way is revealed as a penetrating radical non-duality unifying all people and all of life. The Master's path to this all-embracing unity is the spiritual practice of pure selfless love. Love God intensely, love our neighbor as our own self, bless those that curse us, and pray for those that mistreat us. Love has been lost, becoming nothing more than a word in the dictionary and, yet, it remains the foundation of Jesus' message.

I realize that this seems a bit far afield from mainline Episcopal teaching, but I firmly believe that once we peel away the layers of dogma that have been institutionalized since the death of our prophet, Jesus, we can begin to see the commonality of faith we share will ALL religions, Islam, Judaism, Buddhism, and others. So join me on this journey. If you don't find it appealing, I won't feel bad if you choose not to attend. Because I just cannot lead the forum for a solid teaching year, my plan is to lead the class from September 29 through November 24 (no class November 17), then we will be off until January 5. Then we will go to March 5, break for Lent and Easter, start up again on May 4, and finish our year on May 18.

During our journey in spirituality, there are many, many other topics we can talk about this year or next year, including:

- How was our Bible constructed in the third century?
- What impact did the Council of Nicaea in the fourth century have on how we worship today?
- We will look at several other known Gospels that "did not make the cut," including the Gospel of Thomas. This book has been taught at some Episcopal churches.
- We will look at priests and philosophers of spirituality.
- We may view the movie, *The Gospel of John*, an exact reading of this Gospel.
- The Jesus Seminars. A group of theologians and biblical scholars attempt to produce an accurate Jesus Gospel after analyzing the four Canonical Gospels and the Gospel of Thomas.
- Meditation. Jesus demanded that we love God with our whole heart, body and soul. In our lives it is very hard to hear God. Meditation is a method to hear what God has to say to us.
- Other faiths. As we work our way through spirituality, it is important to understand other faiths and in particular the universal core of all faiths......LOVE.

If the weather is nice, we may meet in the meditation garden. If we do, I will post a note on the door of the Mullins Room. So join me on Sundays at 10 am in the Mullins Room and let us see where this journey takes us.






